While Dr. Kraft was in Grant County on July 24th, he was able to sit down with four companies to talk about the possibilities of collaborating together. Topics ranged from agriculture machine manufacturing, to chemical manufacturing to department of defense.

"It was a very productive day," said Brant Mayo, executive director at the GCEDC. "We were able to tour three companies and visit with another. Everyone has follow up items for after the meetings, but there could be some great collaborations that come from these meetings."

The Grant County Economic Development Council was able to tour the new Quincy High School that is currently being built on Road 11 NW. The state-of-the-art building will be open for the 2019-2020 school year.

The new high school will boast of a new FFA barn, new sports complex, culinary arts facilities, a theater with an orchestra pit, welding, carpentry, a green room for video production

Walking through the almost completed building was hot on a summer day with no AC, but being able to see first hand the decisions that have been made for the school was exciting. Every detail was

Grant County Labor Area Summary



The Washington Employment Security Department released the latest labor area summary. This summary analyzes the economies of Department in 1990. Washington State and focuses on the comparison from May 2019 to May 2018 as well as the annual yearly change from 2017 to 2018.

In Grant County the average annual unemployment rate dipped from 6.3 percent in 2017 to 6.2 percent in 2018. This is the lowest average annual unemployment rate in the County

since electronic records were implemented at the Washington State Employment Security

Grant County's strong economy was able to add 1,370 new jobs to the area between 2017 and 2018, which is an average of 4.7 percent

increase. This amount is almost double to that of Washington State's 2.5 percent increase during the same time period.

We also saw another increase in population of 2.9 percent from 2017 to 2018. Over the last seven years, 2010 to 2017, Grant County saw an increase in population of 6.8 percent.

The top five industries in Grant County are: Agriculture, Local government, Manufacturing, Retail and Health Services. With the diversification of Grant County, it is easy to see why the economy continues to grow.



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
