


5-Year Partnership in Prosperity Budget



Through business expansion, entrepreneurial development, infrastructure investments and workforce development, the Partnership in Prosperity plan targets specific goals to generate capital investment, new payroll, economic circulation and boost economic vitality.

The Convergent Outcomes Lab™ has projected the following impacts of goal success:
